## FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends,

This has been an interesting year of firsts. This year we saw Christmas Eve fall on a Sunday. I don't remember that happening in my ministry before. After some research I realized it did, but that year I was teaching Religion in a parochial school and not in parish ministry, so I guess I didn't really care about it. This year Ash Wednesday falls on Valentine's Day and Easter is on April Fool's Day! There is a sermon in there, isn't there?

As we begin February, we are aware of the cold barren world around us. The days are short, the sky is greyer than usual, our world seems to be dormant. Even for those of us who like winter (I am not one), there is often in February a yearning for the warmth and light of Springtime. I find myself yearning for March.

But how appropriate that this is the time of Lent: cold, dark, barren. During the Lenten season we journey the dark and barren road. We face the parts of life that lead us away from our covenant with God and we prepare ourselves to renew that covenant as our hope is renewed with the joy of the resurrection.

We need dark times. We need the gift of loneliness and sadness once in a while. We need to appreciate the difficult moments of life so that we can truly value the blessings of the good times. If your marriage never has difficulties, how will you ever truly appreciate the very good times? Life can't always be perfect and happy. Religions that focus on the prosperity side of faith and teach how much God wants to bless you do a disservice to the realities of life. Life is not about prosperity and blessings. Sure, they are there and they are wonderful when they happen. But Lent teaches us that there can be value in life even when the days are cold and dark. Lent reminds me that in the midst of February, March is coming. Pastor Tony Campollo reminds us that even on the darkest Friday afternoon...Sunday's coming!

May we enter this season and find in its darkness a sense of the abiding presence of our God. And may that reminder lead us through the darkness of life with sure and certain hope of the glory of the resurrection.

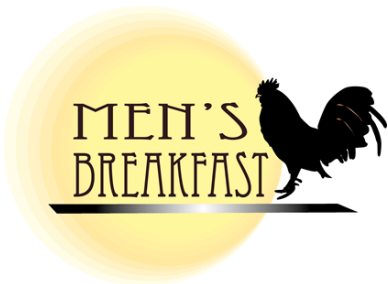

### **FREDERICK SOUP KITCHEN NEEDS VOLUNTEERS**

The Frederick Soup Kitchen, operated by the Frederick Community Action Agency, is in need of volunteers to staff the soup kitchen and serve food to homeless individuals and needy families. The Frederick Soup Kitchen serves a free evening meal 7 days a week to as many as 110 hungry people a night.

Volunteers are needed Monday through Friday from 5:00 to 7:00 p.m. to serve prepared meals and then clean up. It is an enjoyable and rewarding volunteer activity that does not require any special skills. (Volunteers must be at least 14 years of age.)

## Student Homelessness Initiative Partnership (SHIP) of Frederick County

According to the U.S. Department of Education, there are an estimated 1.5 million public school students who experience homelessness each year. These youth live in a variety of unsafe, temporary situations, including cars, parks, the homes of others, shelters, and motels.

In Frederick County Public Schools (FCPS), at the conclusion of the last school year (June 2017), 822 youth had experienced homelessness during that same period. Of that number, 123 students were classified as “unaccompanied” and not living under direct supervision of a parent or guardian. Homeless students were found in 61 out of the 66 schools in the Frederick County School System. This issue cuts across all grades and all ethnic lines. These children are highly vulnerable for abuse, neglect, and trafficking. And sadly, the numbers continue to grow each year.

**SHIP** of Frederick County works closely with Frederick County Public Schools personnel at the school level to provide much-needed items on a regular basis. These supports include hygiene items, new clothing and shoes, youth activities and experiences, and emergency shelter.

Tax-deductible contributions can provide the following much needed items:

\$30 - a child will receive a new pair of shoes

\$40 - a child will receive a new outfit for school

\$65 - a child will receive one night of safety and shelter in a local motel

\$95 - a child will receive registration and equipment for a sports activity

Lenten Group Study for Adults:  
"What Makes a Hero?" by Matt Rawle

The study begins on Thursday, February 15<sup>th</sup> with a morning session at Homewood at 10:30, and an evening session at the church (with pizza!) at 6:30. We'll meet every Thursday through March 22<sup>nd</sup>.

**Candlemas/The Feast of the Presentation  
February 2nd**

Also called The Purification of the Blessed Virgin (Greek Orthodox Tradition), Feast of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, Candlemas is observed on February 2nd in the Western Church.

According to the Mosaic law a mother who had given birth to a man-child was considered unclean for seven days; moreover she was to remain three and thirty days "in the blood of her purification"; for a maid-child the time which excluded the mother from sanctuary was even doubled. When the time (forty or eighty days) was over, the mother was to "bring to the temple a lamb for a holocaust and a young pigeon or turtle dove for sin"; if she was not able to offer a lamb, she was to take two turtle doves or two pigeons; the priest prayed for her and so she was cleansed. (Leviticus 12:2-8)

Forty days after the birth of Christ, Mary complied with this precept of the law, she redeemed her first-born from the temple (Numbers 18:15), and was purified by the prayer of Simeon the Just, in the presence of Anna the prophetess (Luke 2:22). No doubt this event, the first solemn introduction of Christ into the house of God, was in the earliest times celebrated in the Church of Jerusalem. We find it attested for the first half of the fourth century by the pilgrim of Bordeaux, Egeria or Silvia. The day (February 14th) was solemnly kept by a procession to the Constantinian basilica of the Resurrection, a homily on Luke 2:22, and the Holy Eucharist. But the feast then had no proper name; it was simply called the fortieth day after Epiphany. This latter circumstance proves that in Jerusalem Epiphany was then the feast of Christ's birth.

From Jerusalem the feast of the fortieth day spread over the entire Church and later on was kept on the 2nd of February, since within the last twenty-five years

of the fourth century the Roman feast of Christ's nativity (December 25th) was introduced. In Antioch it is attested in 526 (Cedrenus); in the entire Eastern Empire it was introduced by the Emperor Justinian I (542) in thanksgiving for the cessation of the great pestilence which had depopulated the city of Constantinople.

No matter what the name or emphasis, Candlemas became a celebration of the end of the entire Christmas cycle. At times in Church History it was the official end of Christmas, much like Easter ends 50 days later at Pentecost. On a more secular note, celebrating Candlemas or The Feast of The Presentation on February 2<sup>nd</sup> was a way of "Christianizing" a popular pagan celebration of the anticipation of the coming of Spring and the lighter days. This celebration was popular in northern Europe and originally involved a honey badger, but in its present form involves a more American animal. We know it as Groundhog Day!

On Candlemas it has been the tradition to bring forth and bless all the candles which are to be used in the Church during the year. In olden days, lay people would bring all the candles from home and have them blessed as well. It was a reminder that as our candles give light to a darkened world, so Christ came to be a light to a people who lived in deep darkness (Isaiah). So too, we are called to be that light for the world around us. As on December 25<sup>th</sup> we celebrate the "Christ-Mass", so on February 2<sup>nd</sup> we remember the promise of Christ to be the light of the world by celebrating the "Candle-Mass".

Very rarely celebrated in protestant churches anymore, we did celebrate it at Grace Church a few years ago when it was actually on a Sunday! It's fun to remember our traditions and to remind ourselves that we stand in a very long line of faithful men and women who have come before us. We did not invent this thing called Christianity. It runs long and deep in our history and we are honored to be keepers of these traditions. In our home, we keep the tree up and the decorations lit until Feb 2<sup>nd</sup> as a way of commemorating the entirety of the Christmas cycle. (Plus...I just like the decorations!)

### **Upper Room Devotionals**

Devotional booklets are available in the Narthex for anyone who would like a resource for daily prayer. There are regular and large-print versions, and there is no cost for the booklets, although donations are gladly accepted.
